A Child Went Forth, a novel.

This novel centers on the life of one notorious Nigerian patriarch and his charismatic, multigenerational family. In showing how this central character bullies his way through a rapidly-changing 20th century Nigeria, the book draws on themes including Yoruba mythology (vis-a-vis Wole Soyinka), budding ideas of nationhood, the implosion of cultural identity with respect to globalisation—while setting 21st century themes of cosmopolitanism and cultural hybridity into motion.
